ORDER OF THE POSTMASTER GENERAL

GIFT PARCELS ACCEPTABLE FOR ALL PLACES IN CONTINENTAL ITALY

ORDER No. 31222; DATED APRIL 18, 1946.

Effective at once, the service of ordinary (unregistered and uninsured) gift parcels is extended to include all places in the Italian provinces of Gorizia, Trieste, Pola, Fiume, and Zara. Gift parcels are now acceptable for all places in continental Italy.

Order No. 29548, dated October 31, 1945, is modified accordingly.

INSTRUCTIONS OF FIRST ASSISTANT POSTMASTER GENERAL

OVERTIME

In the Postal Bulletin of October 5, 1945, postmasters were instructed to effect an orderly return to the basic 40-hour week for all employees including supervisors. Sufficient time has elapsed that postmasters should now be in a position to eliminate all overtime except in extreme emergencies. There is generally sufficient manpower available that those postmasters who have not already done so may immediately recruit the necessary personnel to permit the elimination of overtime. As set out in the Postal Bulletin of March 7, 1946, no overtime was allowed for the June 1946 quarter except for absolute emergencies. In submitting subsequent requests at any time for overtime, it is incumbent upon postmasters to submit with such request a detailed explanation as to the need for such overtime, as the Department's policy is to disallow all requests for overtime for use in anything except absolute emergencies.

REPORT OF CONVERSION OF SUPERVISORS UNDER PUBLIC LAW 134

The Department has been advised by the General Accounting Office that many postmasters have failed to submit Form 1533 showing conversion of supervisors in their offices in accordance with the act of July 6, 1945, Public Law 134. In this Bureau's letter to postmasters at offices of the first class (S-28, dated July 7, 1945), postmasters were instructed in paragraph 3 that it would be necessary to submit such personnel forms immediately. If this is not done the supervisors' salaries will be disallowed by the General Accounting Office in auditing postmasters' accounts.

In the letter dated July 6, 1945 (S-27), to second-class offices, post-masters were instructed that Form 1533 must be submitted for assistant postmasters and superintendents of classified stations and branches to show the new salary rate as provided by Public Law 134.

If you have not already taken such action, it will be necessary that you immediately submit Form 1533 covering the promotion of all supervisors on your rolls as of June 30, 1945, in accordance with the schedule provided by the act of July 6, 1945, Public Law 134, in order to prevent disallowances in your accounts.

DISPATCHING PARCEL POST OUTSIDE MAIL SACKS

Mail sacks are provided with locking cord fasteners in order that parcel post mail may, so far as possible, be protected from depredation. Therefore all parcels that can be carried safely in this manner without damage to them or to other mail matter should be dispatched inside mail sacks.

Some of the articles which necessarily should be dispatched outside of mail sacks are berries, soft fruits, canes, maps, umbrellas, cut flowers, day-old chicks, eggs, heavy castings and machinery parts, liquids marked "This Side Up", motion picture films and inflammable articles bearing caution labels, parcels weighing 50 pounds or more and parcels too large to go in a sack.

INTERNATIONAL MAILS GIFT PARCELS FOR POLAND

Information has been received from the Postal Administration of Poland that gift parcels, as aid to indigent persons or charitable institutions, containing new or used clothing, shoes, food, and other articles for daily use, including medicines, are admitted importation into that country without customs duty or import restrictions. A handling fee of 10 zlotys is charged on each parcel.

In addition to the articles prohibited transmission by parcel post to foreign countries generally, it is specifically forbidden to include the following in gift parcels for Poland:

Weapons of all kinds.

Medicines containing narcotics.

Artificial sweetening.

Yeast.

Vinegar.

Printed matter.

Money.

Playing cards.

Labels without merchandise.

In order to be admitted free of duty, a gift parcel must not contain more than 2 ounces of tobacco, two-fifths ounce of snuff, 50 cigarettes, or 20 cigars.

The Postal Administration of Poland states that from 20 to 30 percent of the parcels from the United States are received in a damaged condition due to insufficient packing. Postmasters are, therefore, directed to instruct window clerks not to accept any parcels for mailing that do not comply with the packing requirements prescribed for parcels in the international mails and which, consequently, could not be expected to reach destination in good condition. Reports reaching the Department indicate that while many parcels are packed in substantial containers the contents are not solidly packed thus permitting them to shift about in the parcels. Liquids and substances which easily liquefy are often included in the parcels without the protection of absorbent material, as required by section 75 commencing on page 55 of Part II of the July 1941 Postal Guide.

Owing to the enormous volume of gift parcels now being sent abroad, those parcels not securely and substantially packed are unable to withstand the numerous handlings to which they are unavoidably subjected en route to destination.

Postmasters will cause due notice of the foregoing to be taken at their offices.

INSTRUCTIONS OF THIRD ASSISTANT POSTMASTER GENERAL

DISCONTINUANCE OF SALE OF MOTOR VEHICLE TAX STAMPS

The Motor Vehicle Tax Stamp Act approved September 20, 1941, which levied a tax on motor vehicles and boats with regard to each year in which such use occurs, has been repealed by the "Revenue Act of 1945" effective with respect to the period after June 30, 1946.

All postmasters who have been furnished motor vehicle tax stamps for sale to the public are instructed to discontinue such sales after the close of business on June 30, 1946.

Postmasters to whom fixed-credits of motor vehicle tax stamps have been issued are requested to return to their central-accounting postmaster from whom the stamps were received, all stamps on hand immediately after June 30, and to remit undeposited cash for any of such stamps sold. All shipments of stamps and cash shall be by official registered mail.

If any motor vehicle tax stamps, or cash received from the sale thereof, have been lost by burglary, fire, or other unavoidable casualty within the

meaning of section 158, Postal Laws and Regulations, as amended, cash to cover the amount of such loss shall not be included in the stamps and cash sent to the central-accounting office to balance the fixed-credit of such stamps, but in lieu of cash, the postmaster shall forward with the shipment a signed statement showing the date, cause and amount of the loss, whether the loss consisted of cash or stamps or both, the amount of each, and the date claim was, or will be, filed with the Solicitor of the Department for credit on account of the loss.

Every central-accounting postmaster and the Postmaster, Washington, D. C., shall continue to submit a monthly supplemental account or accounts on Form 3346 (revised) beginning July 1, 1946, for each issue stamp heretofore charged pending adjustment of outstanding claims and the receipt of credit notice for unsold stamps returned to the Department for redemption.

EXPORTATION OF CURRENCY TO CERTAIN OVERSEAS A. P. O.'S PROHIBITED

The War Department advises that the exportation of currency to overseas A. P. O.'s or between such A. P. O.'s where the dollar is not the accepted medium of exchange is prohibited. Currency should, therefore, not be accepted for mailing at a domestic post office when addressed to overseas A. P. O.'s or when mailed at and addressed to overseas A. P. O.'s, except those A. P. O.'s which are branches of the post offices at New Orleans, La., and Seattle, Wash.

The foregoing prohibition applies to currency inclosed in letters or parcels sent as ordinary or registered mail.

It is suggested that any desired remittances be made by means of money orders.

Postmasters should give wide publicity to this.

REQUESTS REQUIRED FOR PARCELS FOR OVERSEAS ARMY PERSONNEL

Some postmasters are accepting parcels for mailing at the fourth-class rates of postage to our overseas Army personnel without a request from the addressee as required by Order No. 19687 published in the January 8, 1943, Postal Bulletin and subsequent instructions.

Postmasters are requested to take such steps as may be necessary to prevent the improper acceptance of parcels to our Army personnel overseas.

3-CENT HONORABLE DISCHARGE EMBLEM COMMEMORATIVE STAMP

The 3-cent Honorable Discharge Emblem stamp will be released through the Washington, D. C., post office, on May 9, 1946, and will be available to postmasters throughout the country on requisitions as soon thereafter as necessary supplies can be produced.

The Honorable Discharge Emblem stamp will be 75/100 by 87/100 inches in dimension. It will be printed by rotary process in purple, electric-eye perforated, and issued in sheets of 100 subjects. The central design will be a facsmile of the Honorable Discharge Emblem on a graduated tone background. Across the top in a single line is the lettering "United States Postage" in dark Gothic. In each lower corner appears the denomination "3¢" in dark Gothic numerals. Arranged in two lines between these numerals is the wording "Honoring Those Who Have Served," in dark Gothic. Five stars representing those who died in the five services are arranged horizontally, three above the emblem, and two below centered above the denominational numerals.

Stamp collectors desiring first-day cancellations of the 3-cent stamp may send a limited number of addressed envelopes, not in excess of 10, to the Postmaster, Washington 13, D. C., with cash, money order, or postal note remittance to cover cost of stamps to be affixed. Postage stamps and personal checks will not be accepted in payment. Covers should be of ordinary letter size and each envelope must be properly addressed. An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either sealed or turned in. Orders for first-day covers to the Postmaster, Washington 13, D. C., must not include requests for uncanceled stamps.

For the benefit of collectors desiring stamps of selected quality for philatelic use, the Honorable Discharge Emblem stamp will be available at the Philatelic Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., on and after May 9, 1946. To insure prompt shipment of mail orders to the Agency, they must exclude other varieties of stamps. The Philatelic Agency does not service first-day covers.

Postmasters of direct and central-accounting post offices may immediately submit requisitions on Form 3201-A endorsed "Honorable Discharge Emblem" for a limited supply of the 3-cent stamps. Postmasters at district-accounting offices should withhold their requisitions so as not to reach their central-accounting post offices before May 9, and should not include therein requests for any other varieties of stamped paper.

Postmasters are cautioned not to place the stamp herein announced on sale before May 10, 1946.
